This issue is dedicated to the life and light of Daniel Trilli. Daniel died April 17 due to multiple complications that were brought on by overwork and a lack of ventilation. I was selfishly shocked at the news thinking, "I won't ever get to talk to Daniel again, see that infectious smile."

The following eulogy was written by Daniel's glass mentor and friend, Sam Yemeni. Not many could have expressed Daniel's love of life and glass better.

Daniel Trilli pursued glass with a fervor that I have never seen in any person, under any circumstances, toward anything in my life. He would set his mind to something and accomplish it no matter how long it took and no matter how hard he had to work. Over a very short period of time, Daniel became a glass juggernaut. Working endless, grueling hours, he developed techniques and a style that were immediately influential in the boro glassblowing community. Daniel pushed the envelope of what he could do—simultaneously pushing us as a crew to be better—and set an impossible standard for dedication to his craft.

Daniel was loving and dedicated, strong and intelligent. He faced demons and climbed mountains that most people don't even set their sights on. Daniel's presence energized me, revitalized me, and made me feel invincible again. He became my hero, availing me of things that I didn't even know ruled my life. He relieved me of my adulthood and changed my life forever. Daniel's passing was a tragic loss to many people and to the flameworking community as a whole. His time on the scene left an impact that will stand as strongly as Daniel for years to come.

We will never forget you.
